

- **Trophy History** The photo was taken in 1944. The plaque has only five shields which is consistent with the newspaper description which suggests the plaque was to be in competition for only five years.
- **Background** At the July 8, 1939 meeting of the Executive Committee of the CAAO, Dave Soper offered to donate a trophy for the High School Singles to be called the Abbie Buett Trophy. The offer was accepted. Abbie Buett had been a coxie for the Don and Brockville R.C.'s..He was also the Brockville R.C. coach from 1932 to 1934.[cf.BRC history p.39]. Dave Soper was the head coach at the University of Toronto. At the July 28 meeting, Dave Soper presented a plaque "for five years." [The St. Catharines *Standard*, July 29, 1939, p.3]

- Trophy History 1973: presented for the last time then retired from competition when the last high school race was held at Henley 1974: put into competition for the Heavy Eight at the Canadian Secondary Schools Rowing Association Championship Regatta
- Background Calder Cleland (1922-1943) was a radio operator and air gunner in the Royal Canadian Air Force who was killed during air operations over Sicily. He was not an oarsman, but he was an athlete at Trinity College School. His father, William B. Cleland, was a director of the St. Catharines R.C., a member of the Henley Aquatic Association, and owner of the Jordan Wine Co.. He purchased the Omar Khayyam wine ewer in an antique shop in England before WWII. When William Cleland presented the trophy to the C.A.A.O. in 1945, it replaced the Propeller Club Trophy. The ewer is arguably the most artistic example of gold and silver craftsmanship in existence. In 2011, Sotheby's submitted an insurance value to the C.H.R.C., the trophy's owners, for \$60,000 (U.S.).

Royal Canadian Henley Regatta Trophies - retired **Trophy Name** Challenge Cup for Fours



Winners of the 1881Senior Four: Argonaut R.C. A.G. Thomson, G.F. Galt, J. Hogg, R. McKay The Challenge Cup for Fours sits on the pedestal which apparently was part of the trophy. An 1880 newspaper account gives the cup a value of \$500.

Trophy History 1968: a new trophy for the Senior Four, the Maurice J. Carroll Challenge Trophy, is presented. The original Challenge Cup for Fours appears in a 1945 Henley program photo of a group of trophies. It is not clear if it was still in competition.

Background The Challenge Cup for Fours was one of the original three challenge cups competed for at the First Regatta of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen in 1880. The design was selected by the Regatta Committee of the C.A.A.O. on July 2, 1880. The Association raised the \$500 to pay for it by subscription. Zimmerman, McNaught & Lowe of Toronto designed and made it. Its current location is unknown.

- Trophy History 1926: the event was renamed the Championship Single 1928: semi-retired. A new trophy, the George F. Galt Memorial Trophy, was donated for the Championship Single, but the Challenge Cup was sometimes presented too. 1985: incorporated as part of the People of Port Dalhousie Trophy
 - **Background** The Challenge Cup for Single Sculls was one of the original three challenge cups competed for at the First Regatta of the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen in 1880. The design was selected by the Regatta Committee of the C.A.A.O. on July 2, 1880. The Association raised the \$300 to pay for it by subscription. R.J. Harper & Co. of Montreal designed and made it.

Compiled by Stan Lapinski Revised: December 5, 2023	Florence Saunders (1911-1986) was the childhood sweetheart, then the wife for 51 years of longtime Henley Regatta Chairman, Claude Saunders. As newlyweds, while Claude represented Canada at the 1936 Berlin Olympics, Flo returned to work at Eaton's to support them. She was an original member of the Leanderettes, a group of wives who raised money for the Leander B.C. rowing programme. She served as Claude's secretary, regatta assistant, and provided lunches for meetings at Leanders. Flo and her young children accompanied Claude to Ontario regattas at which he was an official. As adults, her son, Claude, Jr. won 7 Henley medals sculling for Leanders between 1965 and 1969, and her daughters, Lois and Janice worked as regatta volunteers.



Trophy History The Octuple Sculls race was held only once, as part of the Henley 100 celebration in 1982.

Background Kaschper Racing Shells was founded in 1969 by Jacob Kaschper in Lucan, Ontario. He began by building wooden body shells for the London R.C., and continues to produce and develop some of the most advanced full carbon racing shells in the world. The trophy was Jacob Kaschper's contribution to the 1982 celebration of Henley 100.

Background Ken was a sculler who won many races in his 30 year rowing career.

- Trophy History The trophy was donated by Lou Scholes. The photo above was taken in 1949. The trophy appears in a 1944 Henley program photo, and in a 1950 photo, but not earlier or later. In 1974, The Jack Guest Memorial Trophy was donated for the Association Single, so The Lou Scholes Trophy must have been retired by then. Its current location is unkown.
- Background At the 1903 Henley, Lou Scholes (1880-1942) won the Senior Single, and with Frank Smith, the Senior Double for the Toronto R.C.. In 1904, Lou won the Diamond Sculls at the Henley Royal Regatta, the first of only four Canadians to do so, and on his return was given a civic reception before an estimated 80,000 of his fellow Torontonians, including Ned Hanlan. Lou represented Canada at the 1908 London Olympics, but did not medal. Because winners of the Junior Single had to compete in the Senior Single, Scholes felt an intermediate class would help prepare them for that step, so he championed the implementation of the Association Single. He was inducted into the Canadian Olympic Hall of Fame in 1952, and Canada's Sports Hall of Fame in 1955.

- Trophy History 1979: presented for the last time, then retired. The St. Catharines Rowing Alumni Trophy took its place. The new trophy was awarded to the club achieving the highest efficiency. The Maple Leaf Trophy was awarded to the club achieving the most points, a practice which favoured large clubs with many entries.
 - **Background** Three clubs won the trophy: St. Catharines R.C. (22 times): 1949, 1950, 1955, 1961 to 1979; West Side R.C. (6 times): 1951 to 1954, 1956, 1957; Detroit B.C. (3 times): 1958 to 1960. The trophy was created for the Canadian Association of Amateur Oarsmen by the Leckie Manufacturing Co. Ltd. of Toronto, at a cost of \$750.

The Perry Ellis line began with women's wear and expanded over time to include men's wear, accessories, shoes and perfume. The first Perry Ellis fragrances, Perry Ellis for Women and Perry Ellis for Men, debuted in 1985. Trophy History 1937: presented to the C.A.A.O., with the stipulation that it be first awarded to the winners of the High School Eight at the 1937 N.A.A.O. Championship Regatta in Buffalo, New York. Lafayette H.S. won it. 1945: reassigned to the High School Coxed Four. Last photographed in 1951.

Background The Propeller Club of Buffalo was part of a national organization whose membership comprised a cross section of the maritime industry throughout the United States and around the world. Although Buffalo no longer has an active Propeller Club, members in other ports continue to promote, further and support the merchant marine. It is not clear when the trophy was last presented. It appears in a photograph taken on January 31, 1951, but the High School Coxed Four, the race for which the trophy was presented after 1944, continued as a Henley event until 1963. It currently resides at the West Side R.C.. Some of its silver plate was lost in the fire which destroyed the West Side State State State on July 30, 1975.

-	Roy Couch (1895-1959) had success as a lightweight oarsman in the newly-formed West Side R.C. in 1913. He also coached, and in 1921, when West Side inaugurated a high school program, Roy coached Lafayette H.S Roy continued coaching until 1947. He also inaugurated women's rowing at Florida Southern College in 1954 and in March, 1955, his crews were featured in both <i>Sports Illustrated</i> and <i>Life</i> magazines. The trophy is currently housed at the West Side R.C

Trophy History 1963: presented for the last time then retired when the High School Four race was discontinued at Henley. Its current location is unknown.

Background William T. "Doc" Tait (1885-1951) was President of the Niagara District Aquatic Club in 1924. He was also a longtime director of the Henley Aquatic Association, serving as Secretary-Treasurer in 1928, and becoming President in 1950. Doc's widow, Mona, made the inaugural presentation of the trophy at the 1952 Henley. The current location of the trophy is unknown.
